From the Desk of Pastor Tanney How Then Shall We Live?

Pastor Robinson before the Pilgrims sought out a new land to practice their Christian Religion in freedom, inspired his fellow congregants to touch the heart of God, trained them to think the thoughts of God, and helped them practice the government of God in their homes, churches, and civil compacts. Pastor Robinson "the Founding Shepherd of America" exhorted the Pilgrims to search the Scriptures and use the Bible as the primary source for wisdom. He taught them to never stop growing, never stop

listening, and never stop seeking. This advice would guide them in the months and years to follow. In July 1620 sensing the call of God to go to the New World, they sold everything



they had in Holland and poured everything into the trip. Two ships the Speedwell and the Mayflower were leased from London for transport. Some families were split up. Additional passengers called the "strangers" were added to the number. They set out August 5, but twice they were forced back to return to

England. It was rumored that the Speedwell was untrustworthy and had reported leaks. They sold it for half of what they bought it for. Now only of the 121 combined passengers, 102 were chosen. They finally set sail on September 6, 1620.

It was a terrible trip. Non-Christian seamen outnumbered the pilgrims. Terrible weather, crammed lodging arrangements, seasick travelers and a main beam cracked. Sixty-six storm-tossed days, blown off course they landed at Cape Cod. The

> charter granted them land North of Virginia. But they had no authority or charter to step off the ship and establish a legitimate settlement. So how then shall we live? Was a question put to the pilgrims, seamen and merchants. They needed to clearly set out who they were, why they were there,

and agree upon some rules by which they were going to live. With their principles of self-government firmly in hand, they wrote up their own governing document, known as the "Mayflower Compact". It was for Christian and non-Christians. They learned that liberty with little self-government led to

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tyranny and destroyed freedom. It opens with: "In the name of God, Amen. We whose names are underwritten..." What is so different about this charter was the power flow: God, the people, and then the king a civil government operating by covenant, to live together in a committed relationship to fulfill a common purpose. It would be a government based on the rule of law rather than the rule of men.

How then shall we live? Whatever pleases us? By the moral law of God, by the law of the land? Our founding fathers believed that the government of Christ begins in the heart of the individual, practiced in the home, extended in the church and finally in civil society. The Mayflower Compact had a purpose, a mission. "Having undertaken for the Glory of God and the advancement of the Christian faith... a voyage to plant the first colony..."

In our Lenten journey, which may be filled with many tribulations, conflicts and misfortunes, let us not turn back or give up. Let us not forget our religious freedom, who we are, and why we are here. Look to the cross and practice what we believe the greater purpose - God's will in our lives and live accordingly to Him.

Half of the pilgrims died that winter, most of the women died protecting their children from the harsh weather and sickness. The captain pleaded with the remaining to return with him. Yet not one of them went back. Everyone stayed, believing that they had come for a great cause and purpose. Live the legacy!





Stewardship

Hudson Taylor, a Nineteenth Century British missionary to China, is reported to have said,



"God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word.

Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Cor. 10:5).

Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life-giving, faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to gives thanks for His daily provision of it

God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned, "on the mount of the Lord it will be provided" (Gen. 22:14). The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return. Thus, we set aside for the work of God a generous, first-fruits, proportion of the daily bread that God has given to us. This act of trust in the Lord's provision is the working out of our faith in Him.

When budgetary discussions pop up, our natural reaction is to point fingers. But remember your doctrine, and what your mother taught about pointing fingers. Our first natural reaction is not always right. In fact, when our thoughts are brought into captivity of Christ, our first reaction should be repentance.

It should raise questions in our own lives. As good trees in Christ who are to bear good fruit, we should ask whether our thoughts are taken captive by obedience to Christ. Have we given generously? Have we given our first-fruits? You know. And God knows. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron. 16:9).



God will provide. He always has and He always will. He gives His meat in due season. He has not left you as orphans, but has grafted you into His own family. You belong to Him. Remember this, letting this thought dwell in you richly. And you will then be rich toward others.
